
Year 1 News


In Maths year 1 have been trying exceptionally hard to grasp the concept of time. We have been looking at before and after, days of the week and months of the year.


In science we were exploring why exercise is good for our body and in History we have been looking at pictures of Bodmin high street from 70 years ago! Year 1 have been very engaged with this learning and we have had lots of great discussions around each topic.

Year 1 have also completed their phonics screening tests this week, and we are incredibly proud of their achievements. Each child has shown tremendous effort, dedication, and progress in their phonics skills, which are foundational for their reading and writing development. The results for the phonics screening test will be available in July.

Year 2 News







Well, that was a busy week!

In English we finished our innovated bubble story which we renamed Umbrella. I am looking forward to reading these at the weekend.

In maths we have been looking at statistics, so far this week we have looked at tally charts, bar graphs and tables. The children have worked hard on these lessons – the only part they find a little tricky is when they are asked to find out: How many more people preferred cats to dogs? or apples to bananas?

In science we have begun to look at how things are built, this weeks lesson was a recap lesson on waterproof and absorbent materials.

In history we are looking at the impact the Royal Albert Bridge had on Cornwall.

In art we looked at "The Bedroom" painting by Vincent Van Gogh and tried to recreate his brush strokes and colour mixing using acrylic paint.

In RE we have been thinking about breaking rules and forgiving and asking God for forgiveness.

Year 3 News









This week year 3 have worked very hard to finish our fractions topic! This has seen us find fractions of amounts and begin to look at solving problems relating to fractions. This can be really tricky and all the children have persevered brilliantly. In English we've finished learning our story and have started to look at the use of similes and metaphors in our writing, as well as time conjunctions. We've made sure our presentation is also looking fantastic! In science we've investigated using magnets and how these are affected by different items, and in RE we continued with our work on the Jewish festival Passover. We used the Chromebooks to create our own PowerPoints - this was our first attempt and they were all looking fabulous! We'll be using these skills later in our RE unit. We also had a helpful conversation about the importance of kindness, and how we can demonstrate this on a daily basis in our classroom. We're all looking forward to demonstrating these next week!

Year 4 News

Yesterday, we joined a nationwide webinar with an exciting new author, Ash Bond. She introduced us to her new book, the action-packed cosmic world of Peregrine Quinn which is fizzing with humour and full of characters that the children loved, we met a heroic portal guarding trainee dryad librarian, a holographic faun, Olympic gods, powerful plants and a sassy duck! The children enjoyed taking part in this wonderful opportunity.

In Maths this week, we have finished our unit on money and started our new topic of time.

In science, we have studied the components needed to make electrical circuits and explained why different circuits are not complete.

We have continued to perfect our forehand in tennis and controlled a tennis ball when completing tap up's.

Lastly, a huge well done to the children for completing their Multiplication check this week. They have made so much progress learning their multiplication facts over the last few months, we are very proud of them for trying their best with smiles on their faces.



1 - Pupils are invited to take up the **Summer Reading Challenge**¹. It's the UK's biggest reading for pleasure programme for children aged 4 to 11, delivered via public libraries. Children can sign up for free at their local library or online² – please see below for further details.

Last year, in Cornwall 8671 children joined the Challenge.

The Summer Reading Challenge:

- Significantly **improves reading confidence** and independence.
- Ensures pupils are ready for their return to school, preventing the summer reading 'dip'.
 - Aids the **successful transition** between year groups and key stages.
 - Contributes to all pupils' achievement.
 - Encourages extra-curricular activity encouraging family engagement with reading.
 - Develops links between your school, the library and the wider community.

For children who took part in 2023:

- 80% read more over the summer holidays.
 - **70% improved** their reading skills.
- **72% felt more confident** about their reading.

How it works:

- Children sign up through their local library and receive a collector's poster.
- They set a reading goal and borrow books of their choice during the summer, collecting special stickers and incentives.
- Library staff and volunteers help children to discover new books that suit their interests and reading level and run a programme of free themed activities in the library.
 - Children who complete the Challenge are presented with a certificate and a medal. .
